

Kansas Genealogy Research



In 1803, The United States acquired Kansas from France as part of the Louisiana Purchase. From 1804 to 1820, United States government expeditions explored the Kansas region, reporting it to be an arid wasteland. As a result, white settlers avoided the area for many years.

The Santa Fe Trail across Kansas opened in 1821. It served as a wagon road from Missouri to the Southwest until 1880, when the railroad was completed. KS was often a staging area for the Santa Fe, Oregon, Mormon, and California trails. From 1827 to 1853, the United States Army built forts and roads in Kansas for frontier defense and to protect trade along the Santa Fe Trail.

From 1830-1854, Kansas was part of Indian Territory, where 20 tribes from the east were relocated.

In May of 1854, the Kansas-Nebraska Act created two territories extending from the Missouri border westward to the tops of the Rocky Mountains. This opened the area to white settlement. Migration to Kansas was stimulated by rivalry between the North and the South over the slavery issue and over the choice of a railroad route to the Pacific.

On 29 January 1861, Kansas, with its present boundaries, was admitted to the Union as a free state. During the Civil War, over 20,000 Kansas men fought as Union Soldiers. After the war, many more settlers came to Kansas, claiming land under the Homestead Act. Some began breaking the sod of the plains, sowing wheat and other grains. Other settlers helped build the railroad through the state.

In 1867, U.S. Government officials met with leaders of the Indian tribes and signed the Medicine Lodge Peace Treaty. Members of some tribes then moved into Oklahoma.

The **Kansas Historical Society** Library houses printed materials and the **Department of Archives** maintains original records of Kansas government jurisdictions, newspapers, and other historical documents. Early Kansas Churches

Before 1900 the largest religious groups in Kansas were the **Methodist-Episcopal, Catholic, Baptist, Presbyterian,** and **Disciples of Christ.** Methodists came to the Indian Territory in the 1830's, and the Baptists and Presbyterians came in 1837.

Various Christian churches established missions among the Native American tribes:

- Osage Mission (Catholic) 1837
- Shawnee Mission (Methodist)
- Ottawa Mission
- Sugar Creek Mission (near Osawatomie, Linn County)
- Osage Mission
- Potawatomie Mission
- Kickapoo Mission

Kansas Birth and Death Records

Births/Deaths before 1861:

Few vital statistics were kept in the Kansas Territory.

Early Mission records may mention births and deaths.

The Kansas Historical Society has a few early birth and death records on microfilm as well as information about early Mission records.

Confirm early Kansas births by viewing families in the Kansas state and federal censuses, which were taken every five years between 1855 and 1930.

Births/Deaths 1885 - 1911:

Some births, deaths and marriages may have been recorded at the County Clerk's office or a City Clerk's office in register volumes. Not all of these registers have survived.

Obtain a birth or death record dated 1885 – 1911 from the **City Clerk** or from the **County Clerk's office** in the county where the birth or death occurred.

Births from 1910 – 1940:

Some cities in the state kept birth records in these years. Contact the **City Clerk** for information about their records.

Births/Deaths dated 1911 to the present:

Kansas began statewide registration of births and deaths in 1911.

Obtain a copy of a birth or death record dated 1911 to the present from the **County Clerk** where the event occurred or from the **Kansas State Office of Vital Statistics**.

Kansas Marriage Records

Marriages from the 1850's to 1913:

County clerks and clerks of probate courts have been keeping records of marriages since the creation of each county in the state. Some date from the mid-1850s.

Order a copy of a marriage record from the 1850's to 1913 from the **County Clerk** of the County where the marriage license was issued.

Marriages from 1913 to the present:


Beginning in 1913, the State of Kansas began keeping copies of marriage records.
