West Virginia History

Early Native American Tribes who lived in West Virginia included:

- Cherokee -- Mostly associated with North Carolina and points south and west.
- Conoy
- Delaware
- Honniasont
- Moneton
- Shawnee
- Susquehanna

European settlement of present-day West Virginia began in the mid-1700s after Indian claims had been settled. Scotch-Irish and German settlers from Pennsylvania came to the area that is now Berkeley and Greenbriar counties. Other pioneers came from Maryland and other northern states and not from areas east of the mountains.

Until 1776, these early pioneers were governed by Britain. The colony of Virginia included settlers living west and east of the Blue Ridge Mountains. The economic and political interests of the people in the two areas were quite different.



In 1853, Virginia became a state.

During the Civil War, the citizens in western Virginia disagreed strongly with citizens of the rest of the state about secession. As a result, they separated and formed the state of West Virginia in 1863.

Births Before 1917

Virginia counties began recording a few births before 1863; beginning in the late 1880's more births were recorded.

Births 1917 to the Present

In 1917, statewide registration of births began in West Virginia. By 1922, most births were recorded.

Obtain a copy of a birth certificate from the respective **County Clerk** or from the **West Virginia Department of Health**.

Births before 1964

The counties began keeping marriage records when the counties were formed.

Births 1964 to the Present

In 1964, a new law required the counties to send a copy of each marriage record to the West Virginia Department of Health.

Obtain a copy of a marriage record from the respective **County Clerk** or from the **West Virginia Department of Health**.

County Death Records

When Virginia was created in 1853, counties began recording some deaths when the counties formed. In 1917, the state required all deaths to be recorded. Most counties were fully compliant by 1921.

Obtain a copy of a death record from the respective **County Clerk** or from the **West Virginia Department of Health**.

Death Records of persons who died within the last 50 years can be obtained by a direct relative, a funeral director or a person with legal interest.

Other sources of Birth, Marriage, or Death information:

Church records - Newspaper articles/obituaries - Family Bibles - Censuses/Mortality Schedules - Tax Lists - Funeral Home/Cemetery records - Wills/Probate Information

Early West Virginia Church Records

The Church of England (now Protestant Episcopal) was the established church in Virginia (including West Virginia) from 1624 to 1786.

Other major religious groups in West Virginia were the Baptist, Methodist Episcopal, Roman Catholic, and United Brethren churches.

Church records from various denominations are available at the *West Virginia University Library* and the *Archives and History Library*.

The *LDS Family History Library* in Salt Lake City has a few original church records from West Virginia and some published histories. Many church records are also available at the *Library of Virginia*.

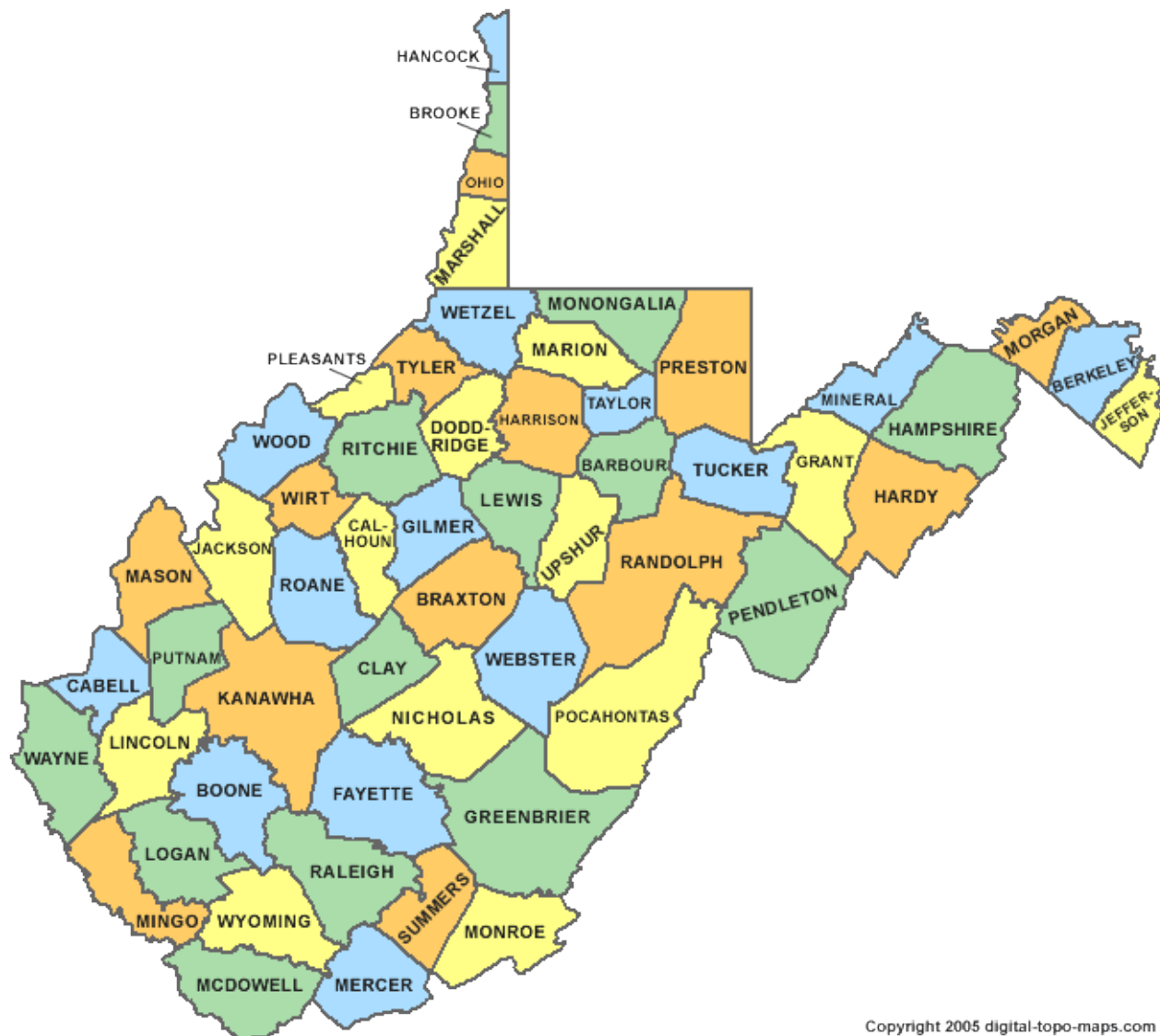

African Ancestry - DNA testing of maternal and paternal lineages of African descent - results are specific countries and specific ethnic groups of origin - uses database of over 30,000 indigenous African DNA samples - <https://africanancestry.com/>

International African American Museum - African American funeral programs, obituaries, marriage records, photos, historical documents and family histories – military records of the U.S. Colored Troops are currently being digitized - <https://cfh.iaamuseum.org/records/>

Last Seen: Finding Family After Slavery - search thousands of “Information Wanted” advertisements taken out by former slaves in all states searching for family members lost by sale, flight, or enlistment – the collection currently includes newspapers from 1853 to 1911 - <http://www.informationwanted.org/>

Slave Voyages - the *Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade Database* documents vessels along the Atlantic slave routes from 1514 to 1866; *Intra-American Slave Trade Database* documents vessels traveling between the Atlantic and Pacific ports ranging from the United States to Brazil; the *African Names Database* gives names, ages, possible origins of slaves liberated from captured slave ships between 1808 and 1862 - <https://www.slavevoyages.org/>
